Controlling Sod Webworms, By Jere Noerager

This year I have received a number of calls concerning tropical sod webworms, a common late summer to fall pest of turfgrass here in the Houston area. Callers say that numerous small, gray moths are flying out of the turfgrass when they walk across their lawns, or arising from their flower beds.

There are several species of sod webworms in Texas but it is the tropical sod webworm that is the most damaging to our lawns. The adults are tan to brownish moths about ³/₄" in size. They hold their wings out alongside their body when at rest, giving them a triangular shape like a fighter jet aircraft.

The adult moths do not feed on turfgrass but rather lay clusters of eggs on grass blades stems and thatch from which tiny caterpillars hatch in about a week. The larvae feed on the turfgrass blades, primarily feeding at night. They then hide in the lawn during the daytime. The larvae eventually pupate and emerge as adults to repeat the life cycle. Several generations of tropical sod webworms can occur during the year but it is generally the late summer to fall generations that are the most numerous and damaging to our lawns.

Areas of injury are usually spotty at first but can quickly grow in size as caterpillars migrate outward in search of food. In addition to identifying the adult moths, the larvae can be forced to come up out of the thatch by sprinkling soapy water on the turf, causing them to crawl up on grass blades. Larvae are usually light green from having consumed grass blades, with numerous dark, raised spots along the length of their body.

The turfgrass usually recovers in time but if already in a weakened state may die in some areas. Recovery of St. Augustine is especially slow when damage occurs in the fall. If three to four sod webworm larvae are found within a 6inch-square section of dying sod, then chemical treatment is recommended.

There are several products including synthetic pyrethroids and the organic product Spinosad that are effective in controlling tropical sod webworms. However, finding an over-the-counter product label for sod webworm control in turf can be challenging. It is important to spray early – and several times at one-week intervals - in an infestation before much damage has occurred.

Insecticides can be applied in either spray or granular form. Spray solutions can be applied with a garden hose sprayer or compressed air sprayer. Watering the lawn before application will aid penetration into the turf. Granular insecticides are easier to use and generally provide more thorough coverage. This type of insecticide can be applied with a fertilizer spreader. Following application, the lawn should be watered for about an hour to wash the granules into the matted turf. Use insecticides containing acephate (Orthene®), bendiocarb (Dycarb® or Turcam®), carbaryl (Sevin®), or the microbial insecticides Bacillus thuringiensis ssp. Kurstake (B.t.k.) and ssp. Aizawai (B.t.a). The microbial insecticides are specific for caterpillars and thus do hot harm non-target arthropods or animals.

Neighbors are also reminded that Tealwood's Deed Restrictions require that, "No garbage or trash shall be maintained on a Lot so as to be visible from any street in the Subdivision or any neighboring Lot except to make the same available for collection and then only the shortest time reasonably necessary to effect such collection." Please remind your Landscaper as well.

Tealwood Real Estate Market 2020 And 2019



As you might imagine, 2020 has been a year of trials and tribulations and one that most of us want to "just be over"

Regarding activity in Tealwood, according to the Houston Association of Realtors, based on the past 12 month's of activity, there is a 5 months supply of inventory in Tealwood.

Currently there are 2 active listing currently on the market in Tealwood with an average sales price of \$914,000 priced at \$250 a sq/ft, an average of 3,645 building sq/ft and 107 days on the market.

There have been 2 homes sold this year and one on Gessner. The average, not including Gessner, sales price is \$1,125,750 at \$244 a sq/ft, an average 4,584 building sq/ft and 48 days on the market with an average sold price to list price of 95.45%.

The Gessner home sold at \$789,000 priced at \$235 a sq/ft, 3,356 building sq/ft and 147 days on the market at 99% sales price to list price.

2019 was a more robust year with 8 homes selling in Tealwood and one on Gessner.

Average sold price not including Gessner, was \$764,250 at \$231.51 a sq/ft, 157 days on the market, 3,341building sq/ft and at 94.53% sales price to list price.

1 home sold on Gessner with a sales price of \$641,000 at \$204,66 a square foot, 3,132 building sq/ft, 48 days on the market and at 1.01% sales price to list price.
