President's message continued:

The Tealwood website (Tealwood.org) and Tealwood Times newsletter were both modernized and the board has begun transitioning electronic document to archiving. We all own a debt of thanks to the Tealwood Directors, Officers and supporting Committee members whose hard work made this all possible. I would to specially thank our retiring Directors and Officer for their service: Scott Nesbitt, Jack Spruth, Diane Stout and John Shoemaker.

Our Association's members elected a new Board of Directors/Officers at its Annual Meeting on February 24. The elected slate is as follows:

Looking ahead, our Association faces a number of challenges which our new Board will need to address. First, our Association's Budget is experiencing rising cost pressures. The costs for the garbage collection, insurance, as well as the constable patrol program are rising. In addition, our Association's Bylaws and Deed Restrictions, last revised in 1998, need to be updated to better align them with Texas law. However, this update process requires expensive legal services.

Our Association Board was successful in capturing outstanding City of Houston garbage rebates which has helped to partially offset these

rising costs for this year. However, HOA dues will have to rise in 2016. Hence, one of the goals for our new Board will be to search for cost reduction ideas.

Second, our Association needs to formalize its enforcement of its Deed Restrictions. A number of our surrounding subdivisions have lost their ability to enforce many of their restrictions because of either chronic inaction or inability to define a set of clear standards. The value of each of our homes is directly impacted by standards the Association sets, hence it is in all of our best interest to keep those standards high and enforce them.

Third, a lot of concern and confusion surrounds the City of Houston's intentions for our stretch of Gessner. The attempted annexation of the northern portion of Gessner by TIRZ-17 and a capital project by the Houston Public Works department both seemed to indicate that plans for the widening of Gessner could be in place. After discussions with the City of Bunker Hill Village, Mayor Jay Williams stated at our recent Annual Meeting that he would oppose any widening of Gessner now and into the future. Council Member Oliver Pennington has written a letter to the Public Department challenging the need for widening Gessner, suggesting the current traffic problems delays have more to do with the timing of traffic lights at Briar Forest and Westhemier. While our Association has limited control over this issue, we will continue to resist the widening thru constructive dialogue with both Cities.

In closing, I wish to thank you for assistance and support to the Tealwood Homeowners Association. It is a pleasure serving you.
